A motion was made and accepted that Mark Gauthier be authorized to secure telephone service for ACGS. The service which we are acquiring will be a business phone, which is secured. It should have call forwarding and will probably include a limited service.

The Court shall have jurisdiction over the most serious crimes of international concern, namely genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and the crime of aggression. The Court shall be composed of 18 judges, who shall be elected by the Assembly of States Parties to the Statute. The Court shall have the power to investigate and prosecute individuals, and to issue arrest warrants and summonses. The Court shall also have the power to issue orders for the protection of victims and witnesses, and to provide reparations to victims.

The Court shall be organized into three chambers: the Presidency, the Trial Chamber, and the Appeals Chamber. The Presidency shall be composed of three judges, one of whom shall be the President of the Court. The Trial Chamber shall be composed of three judges, and the Appeals Chamber shall be composed of three judges. The Court shall also have a Registry, which shall be responsible for the administrative and logistical support of the Court. The Court shall have its seat in The Hague, the Netherlands.

The Court shall have jurisdiction over individuals who are alleged to have committed the crimes listed in the Statute.
